


#### What Are Councils of Government?

- Regional Councils or Councils of Government, COGs, are interlocal cooperatives also designated as Substate Planning Districts by the State of Oklahoma and Economic Development Districts by the U.S. Department of Commerce
- ▶ A COG is a voluntary association of local governments, situated in either a metropolitan or rural area, designed to promote discussion and intergovernmental cooperation among its members concerning common and regional problems, and to engage in planning on a multijurisdictional basis.

## What Councils of Government Do

- COGs are generally planning and resource organizations.
- COGs maintain regular contact with State and Federal agencies.
- There are 77 counties and 594 municipal governments in Oklahoma. The 11 COGs provide an efficient and effective way to collaborate, communicate and transfer resources at a low administrative cost.

# Grant Programs Common to Oklahoma COGs

- ► CDBG (US-HUD, ODOC)
- ► EDA (US-DOC)
- ► REAP (OK)
- ► OTHERS (USDA, US-EPA, US-DOT, OK-DOT)
  - Referral and/or grant preparation assistance



## Becoming Grant Eligible

- ► SAM Registration Unique Entity ID (UEI)
  - ► The UEI is a 12-character alphanumeric ID assigned to an entity by SAM.gov. Active registration in SAM.gov provides your entity the ability to apply for federal grants or loans or bid on government contracts.
- Audit Reports
  - An independent auditor reviews your financial and program results to determine whether you are meeting your goals and complying with financial management requirements.
- Economic Distress Level, Low-to-Moderate Income determines grant eligibility and/or cost sharing



#### **CDBG-Revitalization**

- Addresses quality of life needs in rural communities (e.g., road improvements, public structure renovations)
  - ► Grant Maximum \$300,000
  - ► Application deadline March 30
  - ► Match 40%-50%
- Ranking Criteria
  - Benefit to LMI persons
  - Amount of funds needed
  - Leveraging of funds
  - Previous CDBG award



#### CDBG-Water/Wastewater

- Construction of water or wastewater project
  - ► Grant Maximum \$600,000
  - ► Application deadline May 1
- Ranking Criteria
  - Benefit to LMI persons
  - Severity of need
  - ▶ Water rate structure, generating capacity
  - Ability to finance
  - Amount of funds needed
  - Leveraging of funds
  - ODEQ permitting



#### **EDA**

- Projects that leverage existing assets to advance economic prosperity in distressed communities
  - ► Grant Maximum \$1-\$2 million
  - ► No application deadline
  - Match 30%-40%




#### **REAP**

- Construction of water or wastewater project
  - ► Grant Maximum \$75,000
  - ► Application deadline June 1
- Ranking Criteria
  - Population
  - ► Type of entity
  - Operational revenue
  - Cost benefit
  - Leveraging of funds
  - ▶ Jobs created or saved
  - ► Type of project
